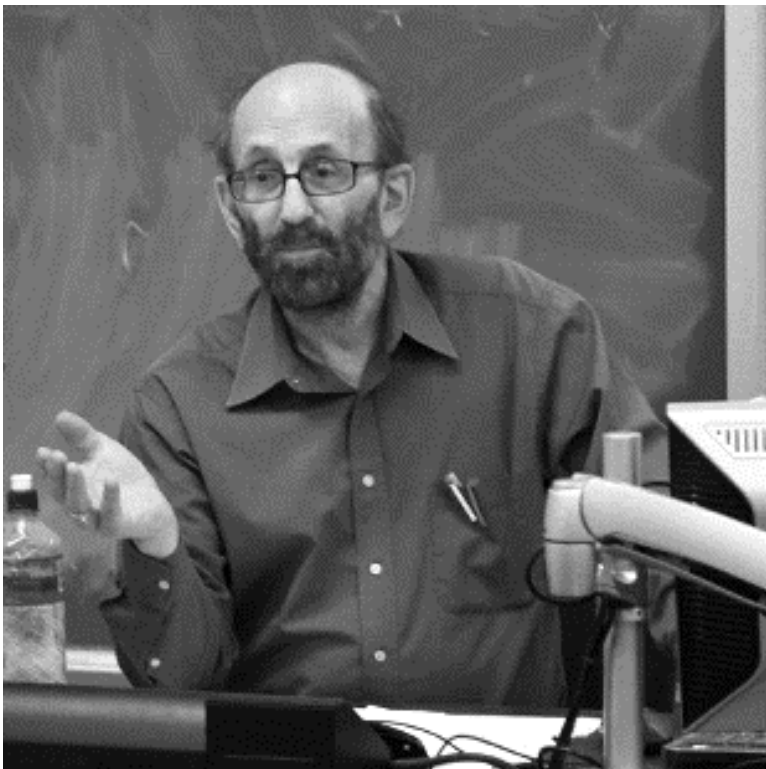


# Class, Race, and the Civil Rights Movement
